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A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR



Despite many challenges over the past few years, Camp Cadicasu has kept a steady focus. With innovation at the forefront, we reassesed how we have done business for decades and developed creative solutions to meet the needs of today. Our main goal of serving our community and the greater good remains unchanged.

The market has dictated that camps improve and respond to increasing financial constraints. Adaptability is expensive. Donors have become scarcer and our ability to grow revenue with our programs is limited based on our existing facility space. Cadicasu has drawn on the hard work of our staff team and the support of our community to become more relevant. We re-established the essential role of camps within the larger recreational context. Along the way, we have become more inclusive attracting children and youth from a variety of different backgrounds.

We have maintained the integrity that has been part of camp since its inception in 1930 by modelling kindness and compassion. **Respect for every individual human dissolves any perceived differences so we can coexist harmoniously.** These beautiful connections with others unfold as we all pursue healthy living and a balanced wellbeing.

The board and staff work together to ensure our activities appeal to a wide range of interests. We are mindful of the growing trend towards specialization and have programs catered to specific interests. Being responsive to change while sticking to the basics has proven that we are enticing option for families who want to send their kids to camp.

In addition to our summer and winter camps, our school field trips invite students to **learn about the environment in an ideal setting.** We also open our doors to rental groups to escape the city and spend quality time together running their own programs and / or enjoying our signature camp activities and games.





Our proprietary events (including a Yoga Retreat, Forest School, and Christmas Event) provide recreational opportunities to the public throughout the year. Most recently, we became the **ONLY certified Activity Provider for the Duke of Edinburgh Adventurous Journeys in Alberta**. This allows us to offer hiking trips to help participants complete the last step for each level of the Duke of Edinburgh program.

As the economy begins to recover, the projected increase in demand for camp has already begun. We are currently operating at full capacity during the summer. Our waiting lists are the longest they have ever been.

The summer camp industry is expected to experience significant growth over the next five years. Cadicasu's strategic plan includes expanding our physical space to maximize revenue. Sponsors, donations, and partnerships will continue to be important during this time. We encourage participation in our upcoming fundraising initiatives.

The board is dedicated to helping as many people as possible and making their camp experiences meaningful. Until next time, we promise to remain committed to doing the best we can for our campers and visitors with a healthy dose of laughter, fun, and nights spent singing songs by the fire.




Juniors Ages 7 - 10

SPECIALTY CAMPS

Our Specialty Camps were created to offer challenging opportunities for teenagers to increase their awareness and learn how to be comfortable in the sanctuary of nature. They allowed us to increase our summer capacity and establish exclusive programs that are not offered anywhere else.

By focusing on the skills of our ancestors who were caretakers of the land, **campers develop a deeper connection to the earth**. They explore Kananaskis Provincial Park with talented instructors who are specifically hired to share their expertise from their respective fields. We are continuing to grow and expand these camps.



APISI: Earth Skills

Apisi teaches campers techniques required to not only survive in the wilderness, but to thrive and enjoy the outdoors. Learn bushcraft such as shelter building, bow drill fire, tracking, camouflage, cordage, and more.



ONAWA: Advanced Earth Skills

This program is for campers who want to dive deep into more advanced survival skills and the philosophy behind them. Graduates of the Apisi program are recommended to try this, but anyone ready for a challenge is welcome.



SUMMIT: Backpacking Introduction

Summit provides an awesome experience for campers looking to participate in longer hiking trips. With two separate excursions throughout the week, they get a taste of more difficult out-trips and view some beautiful sights.



JOURNEY: Backpacking Expedition

Journey is an opportunity for hikers who are eager to experience the breathtaking beauty of the mountains. Campers are guided along trails with heavy packs through various terrain and elevation levels.



EKTA: 2SLGBTQIA+

A unique opportunity for youth who identify as part of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community to come together in a safe space. Campers create a support network with others through a shared experience outdoors.



NAMASTE: Yoga & Mindfulness

Awareness with a focus on the present is taught through breathing exercises, movement, guided visualizations, and nature-based activities. Campers learn yoga poses and experience the power of peaceful moments.



PROTECTOR: Martial Arts

Protector campers have days filled with physical movement and exciting adventures. Martial arts is used as a method to teach self-discipline, a foundation for personal protection, and a way to build confidence.



LIT: Leader-in-Training Program

Our LIT program creates young leaders in our community. Participants gain skills and practical work experience. Leadership development and responsibility are at the core of this transformative program.

Our Specialty Camps allow teenagers to grow at camp while discovering new interests. They get to broaden their horizons in the place they love and already feel comfortable.

We welcome rental groups in our winterized cabins throughout the year. Located halfway between Calgary and Banff, we are **in the heart of Kananaskis Country.** Our visitors maximize the use of our facilities while not being used for our own programs.

Opening our doors to rental groups helps cover a portion of our opeartional expenses and has allowed us to keep our summer registration fees affordable. With over 100 beds, a restaurant quality kitchen, an abundance of fresh air, indoor plumbing, and recent renovations, we offer a secluded getaway in the mountains.

TREASURER REPORT



What an exciting year for Camp Cadicasu! Despite emerging from a chaotic operating environment in 2020 and 2021 with some lingering challenges related to the pandemic, the camp was able to return to relatively normal operations in 2022.

Revenue increases are driven primarily by camper fees and growth in rentals as summer registrations returned to full capacity. The additional revenue coincides with reductions in government COVID related subsidies.

As with many businesses this past year, the team has had to manage significant inflation in costs, most notably with direct costs including food, supplies, and labour.



Once again, the incredible team at Camp Cadicasu continues to deliver an exceptional camp experience while ensuring a solid financial foundation to ensure the long-term viability of the camp.




REVENUE & EXPENSES

2022 Revenue





2021 Revenue





Summer camp is such a magical place, and we don't want that experience limited to only certain kids. **Everyone should have the opportunity to grow and have fun at camp!**


Acceptance and appreciation of all people is learned through being a part of our diverse community. The relationships and solidarity that flourish at camp are nothing short of amazing.
